GOVERNING DOCUMENT

The organisation is a charitable company incorporated on 11th August 2017 and registered as a Charity on 10th April 2019. The company was established under a Memorandum & Articles of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2023

OBJECTIVE OF THE CHARITY

The objective of the charity is to support children and young people, their families and siblings with special educational needs (neurodiverse) in order to preserve and protect their physical and mental health through the provision of recreational opportunities & life skills training.

Focus of our work

Potential Kids provides a wide range of activities for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities. The target groups are neurodivergent children and young people (CYP) aged 6yrs+ and specifically includes those with learning difficulties, mental health issues and physical difficulties.

Neurodivergence includes Autism, ADHD, Dyslexia, Dyspraxia and other related differences.

In addition to providing education, learning and training opportunities for its children and young adults it also assists with the provision of support and mentoring for them, their siblings and families to promote social inclusion and fairness.

Potential Kids works collaboratively with an ever-increasing number of charities, statutory bodies and business service providers to support some of the most vulnerable members of the community.

We provide individual tuition, teaching and mental health and wellbeing support at family sessions in the Community and Learning Garden.

Growth and Achievements

Over the last year the charity has delivered more sessions and now offers at least 20 sessions / activities per month to over 500 beneficiaries and their families and / or carers.

Our specific achievements include:

- Started free Saturday Family Football sessions, providing a regular accessible family activity for the PK community. This has proved very popular.
- Increased our offerings with the popular 'Learn to Fish' sessions, which enables our young people to learn a new skill and help boost their self-esteem and confidence.
- Held an inclusive Coronation Party in our Community and Learning Garden to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III, enabling PK families to take part and share the experience in an accessible way.
- STEAM Home Education sessions increased by 35% due to demand.
- Digihal supported PK as their charity, providing social groups for parents to help support carers.
- Community Warm Spaces opened, offering comfortable space and refreshments for vulnerable members of the local community in our heated cabin in the Community and Learning Garden. We also helped individuals through the Cost-of-Living Crisis.
- Over 400 individual and group sessions were run throughout the year; this represents an increase of over 40%
- Bespoke activities were run including water sports sessions and visits.

- Facilitated over 260 hours of 1:1 tutoring for our beneficiaries who were unable to access full time education in school settings.
- Collaborated with Welwyn Hatfield School partnership to run weekly sessions for their 'Emotional Based School Avoidance (EBSA) sessions for students with low or no attendance at school. Strength, Balance, Body and Mind (SBBM) sessions are delivered in the PK Community and Learning Garden for vulnerable students, potentially enhancing the life chances and increasing their potential. Without use of this space the programme would have struggled to continue running, leaving vulnerable individuals unsupported.
- Continued to strengthen our relationship with NHS Social Prescribers, as well as Herts County Council, The Virtual School, Food Bank and Hatfield Men's Shed in delivering teaching, group and 1:1 sessions to support our CYP.
- Continued growth of the Volunteers programme. Many of our volunteers are neurodivergent and joined PK as beneficiaries. They now use their skills and interests to help others, which has improved their mental health through boosted self-esteem and confidence.
- We secured grants from a variety of funders; these include Hertfordshire County Council (HCC), Herts Community Foundation, Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council, Sport England, HCC Building Better Life Chances, Tesco, and Albert Hunt Trust. We are very grateful to all our funders for their support.

Future Plans

Subject to securing satisfactory funding, the Charity's plans for next year include:

- Recruitment of a part time Project Co-ordinator to assist with managing and delivering more sessions, effectively and efficiently
- Continuing to grow our offerings in the Community and Learning Garden to provide more bespoke sessions for those in need
- Continuing to develop deeper working relationships with the local Social Prescribers
- Continuing to raise awareness and profile of the charity within the local and wider community
- Extending our training opportunities for our children and their families through our OCN offering
- Continuing to be needs led and further developing our Alternation Provision offer which includes partnership working with Hertfordshire County Council
- Continuing to offer a Warm Space Hub for the most vulnerable within our community
- Fundraising efforts to continue to focus on grant applications to help secure core funding to support our growth
- We would like to extend our sincere thanks to all our volunteers, trustees, and sponsors for their support and dedication to ensuring the sustainability and growth of the charity.
